

The Foundation Degree in Youth Justice (FDYJ) is a vocational qualification designed to support staff working in the secure estate and across the wider youth justice system. It equips staff with the specialist knowledge and practical skills needed to work effectively with children in secure settings, where safeguarding, rehabilitation, and positive relational practice are central to everyday work.

Staff will develop confidence in assessing and planning for children's needs, understanding their behaviour, and building constructive relationships that support positive outcomes. The course also strengthens resilience and professional judgement, preparing staff to handle complex and sensitive situations with assurance, while offering a clear route to further career progression through to a full BA (Hons) in Youth Justice.

- Gain specialist knowledge of child development, youth justice policy, and approaches to engaging and supporting children in custody.

Staff completing the FDCJ will gain practical skills to assess, plan, and work effectively with individuals in custody, alongside an enhanced professional understanding of criminal behaviours, rehabilitation, and multi-agency working. The course also builds confidence and resilience, equipping staff to handle complex situations with assurance, while providing a clear pathway for career development through progression to a full BA (Hons).

# **Progression Pathways**

# From foundation to honours

Both the Foundation Degree in Youth Justice (FDYJ) and the Foundation Degree in Criminal Justice (FDCJ) provide a **clear route to a full BA (Hons)**, enabling staff to continue their professional and academic development.

# **BA (Hons) Youth Justice**

Staff who complete the FDYJ can progress to Level 6 study, choosing either

- Managing and Coaching in Youth Justice, covering public sector management, workforce reform, and implementation, or
- Social Policy and Youth Justice, exploring political ideology, children in care, social policy, diverse needs, children's rights, and international youth justice systems

BA (Hons) students also undertake an **Independent Research Module**, allowing them to apply research skills to a topic of professional relevance.

# **BA (Hons) Crime, Criminology & Criminal Justice**

Staff completing the FDCJ can progress to Level 6 study, selecting from a range of **Contemporary Issues and Debates in Criminal Justice** optional blocks:

• Transnational crime, Drugs and society, Covert research in theory and practice, Victims of crime, Hate crime, Terrorism, Policing protest, Tackling recidivism and promoting desistance.

CCCJ students also complete an **Independent Research Project** (BA Hons only), enabling them to explore an area of interest in depth. This pathway builds advanced knowledge, critical thinking, and professional credibility across the prison service, secure estate, and wider criminal justice system.





# Crime, Criminology and Criminal Justice (CCCJ)

Our Crime, Criminology and Criminal Justice (CCCJ) pathway aims to answer the key questions surrounding the motivations behind people who commit crimes and how the criminal justice system responds to them. You will explore critical concepts such as the psychology of crime, the nature and impacts of crime on society and how crime can be prevented.

As you progress, you will engage with topics such as crime prevention, policing, sentencing, and rehabilitation, alongside a critical examination of issues like social justice, diversity, and the complexities of the legal system. The course equips you with the knowledge and skills to understand criminal behaviour, research crime, and develop effective responses within the criminal justice system, all while addressing contemporary debates in crime and justice.

# A buildable pathway to learning

Our flexible degree pathway allows you to work towards a full BA (Hons) degree at your own pace by earning credits one module at a time. Each module is worth 60 credits, with a total of 360 credits required to achieve a full BA (Hons).

As you progress, you will gain standalone, recognised qualifications, starting with a Certificate of Higher Education (120 credits), advancing to a Diploma of Higher Education (240 credits), and ultimately completing the BA (Hons).
